Dear Parents

One year in office, Pope Francis has made a huge impact on the world stage: 10 million followers on Twitter; most referenced on Facebook; Time Magazine 'Person of the Year 2013' and Fortune Magazine's 'World's Greatest Leader' (April 2014) – "a Leader's job is to define reality and give hope". In the words of Nancy Gibbs, the Managing Editor of Time "he has not changed the words, but he's changed the music".

The words remain the same. The Christian message is 2,000 years old. Easter is more than the renewal of a historical event. It is the cornerstone of our faith. It is a reminder that even in death, we will rise again. No matter what the circumstances, the setback, the challenge, we can overcome it and through Christ, live a life of victory.

What is victory? Is it a Cup Double? An All-Ireland Table Tennis Title? A race on the Liffey? Choral performances? Parents are key stakeholders in our community. May I encourage your continuing participation in three simple rewarding ways: **firstly**, to visit our new website. There were 12,237 visits by 6,969 unique visitors in the first two months. Soon, you will be able to chart your son's academic performance on the website. **Secondly**, to attend our Junior Musical – Connemara! – which will run for three nights in May, in the Jubilee Hall (12th/13th/14th -please note change of date). **Thirdly**, to view the Evie Hone drawings on St Patrick's Hall. These were purchased at auction by the Parents' Council and donated to the College in memory of the late Fr Sean Farragher CSSp., College Archivist, Historian and member of the College Community for an extraordinary 64 years, before his death last December. I thank the Parents' Council Chairman Dermot Kelly and his Committee for their benevolence and their recognition of Fr. Sean.

Finally, our goal has always been to cultivate in our boys the best habits of the heart and mind, of the aesthetic and the practical, of the physical and the spiritual; to foster in them a strong character that loves to do the right thing, inspired by the Christian message.

I thank the many members of our extended community – the Spiritans, colleagues, parents and students, past and present – who share the 'Fides et Robur', the indomitable Blackrock spirit.


House Competitions

GOAL/AIDLINK ST.PATRICK'S DAY BADGE PROJECT

The badge campaign was launched by Mr Mario Rosenstock on 10th March in the College. The largest school fundraiser in the country looks like it is going to be a great success again this year. The boys have worked with great enthusiasm and energy in the hope of raising a significant amount of money for *GOAL* and *Aidlink*. Over 170 students were involved in the project. They visited primary and secondary schools, approached businesses both in Ireland and abroad for support and distributed over 100,000 badges nationwide.

The culmination of the campaign was a city centre street collection on the I3th and I4th March when shoppers were bombarded with a shamrock charm offensive. Over the course of the two days, the boys raised the very impressive sum of €4,738.II. This helped us enormously in organising the logistics of the street collections. Guidance and Counselling



All Leaving Cert students have now submitted a CAO application. A number of 6th years have also submitted their portfolios for relevant courses like architecture, art and design while others applying for music and drama related courses are awaiting auditions. As well as this some students have applied for scholarships in a range of different third level institutions. CAO will also allow students to use the Change of Mind facility from May 5th until July 1st 2014 at 5.15pm. With this facility students can change their course order as well as adding in new courses to their course lists. However, students cannot add in restricted courses at the Change of Mind stage. There is also a Late Application deadline to CAO of May 1st 2014. The message to all CAO applicants, even in these challenging economic times is still to apply for third level courses which are of interest to them and consequently they will be motivated to engage with these courses and find satisfaction and success.

A number of 6th year students have also made DARE applications this year. As well as this another eighteen 6th year medicine applicants sat the HPAT test on March 1st. These students will receive their results of the HPAT in late June. Some Leaving Certificate students have also firmly accepted offers through UCAS in Great Britain while others still await final offers.

Open days continue for Post Leaving Certificate (PLC) courses and a number of students have submitted applications for these courses. There are an ever increasing number of PLC courses, Level 5 and Level 6 FETAC on offer at present. Exciting opportunities are available to students when they do a Level5/Level6 FETAC course, which allows them the freedom to progress to Level 7 and Level 8 on the National Qualifications Framework. This progression can take place from one college to another or to a university. If a student receives a level 5/6 FETAC award he can use the result in place of his Leaving

cert results. It is very important for all students to understand this progression and its implications. Further information is available from the career counsellors in the college.

At present many 6th years have completed and are busy completing field studies in Geography, research documents in History and Religion, notebooks in Home Economics as well as practicals in Art, Construction Studies and Design and Communication Graphics. These students find it comforting that they have already completed work worth 20-40% of the Leaving Certificate examination in particular subjects. The Leaving Cert students have also completed their modern language orals.

Nine 6th year students recently competed in the final of the All Ireland Linguistics Olympiad which was held in Trinity College Dublin on March 25th. This is a contest in which students develop their own strategies for solving problems in fascinating real languages from around the globe. Students must use their ingenuity to solve puzzles such as deciphering Egyptian hieroglyphics; interpreting Tenji, the Japanese equivalent of Braille and writing the names of football teams in Chinese. No prior knowledge of linguistics or a second language is required: even the hardest problems require only logical ability, patient work and a willingness to think around corners. The goal is to develop students' problem solving skills and to inspire them to consider the fascinating range of careers at the intersection of language, linguistics and computing. The students that partook in this competition are now awaiting the results of the

All year groups have now sat and received their Easter exam results. Counsellors in all year groups continue to monitor the academic attainment and extra-curricular involvement of all students in the college.

Seán, members of the Community, colleagues, parents past and present, and friends.

The Parents' Council had bought the three cartoons at an Auction in Whyte's on February 24th and presented them in memory of Fr Seán Farragher.

Fr Seán had been a member of the College Community since 1949 and College Archivist since 1957. He was much loved and revered by many generations of 'Rock men as a teacher, founder and leader of the legendary Camera Club, as well as author of many books on the history of the College, the Spiritan Congregation and its

Mr Wyer, Head of Art at Blackrock gratefully accepted the cartoons on behalf of the College and in his address, he outlined their historical significance and inspiration.

Evie Hone, a painter and stained glass artist of international renown had converted

to Catholicism and was accepted into the Church at Blackrock College in 1937. The Pentecost stained glass windows commissioned by the College Union in 1942 in celebration of John Charles McQuaid's elevation to Archbishop of Dublin.

Fr Stephen Farragher, Fr Seán's nephew, spoke on behalf of the family, which was also represented by his sisters Bride and nieces Marie and Geraldine.
