Dear Parents,

We marked the Feast Day (2nd October) of the co-founder of the Spiritan Congregation, Claude Poullart des Places, by a Whole School Assembly in the Sports Hall. It is important to bring our boys together. It strengthens community, reaffirms values, gives witness to our shared identity. It provides an occasion when our younger boys can sit with our 6th Years and see how they interpret and live the College mission. Role models are important; it is hard to be what you cannot see.

At the Assembly, **Peter Murphy** (6th Year) urged us not to underestimate how you "affect the people around you, both positively and negatively". Peter reflected on his experience on Pastoral Placement (P.P.), in Transition Year, at the Royal Hospital Donnybrook where many of the elderly patients suffer from dementia or Alzheimers "it is quite a grim place". Like many Transition Year boys who engage in the P.P. programme Peter discovered that "he got much more from his service there than the help he gave". It is in giving that we receive.

Harry Hughes (6th Year) spoke about his retreat with 13 fellow 6th Years at Mount St. Joseph Abbey Roscrea and the impact it had upon him. He said that he learnt the importance of paying a compliment to another, to show appreciation for those around you. He challenged us: "which three words would you want people to use to describe you? Live by them".

Powerful stuff. This is peer ministry at its finest. This is what we want from our boys, for our boys.

There are many within our student body who give so much be it at the Student Council, on the Green Schools or Student Wellbeing Committees, as House Captains, as Ministers of the Eucharist (18 have been commissioned this year) or as choristers, musicians, performers in the Arts or Sport. We ask them at the same time to share and acknowledge talent, to look for the good in others, to act with decency, integrity and propriety and to take time through their everyday gestures and actions to give more than they receive.

Encourage your sons to **reach – reach in** to themselves; build their faith, their spirit, so that they see God in all that they do; **reach out** to others; be that supreme encourager that Harry and Peter urge each one of us to be.

The recent visit of Fr. John Wambu, Principal of the Holy Ghost Mission School Machakos, to Blackrock reminded us of the difference we can make. Over the last eight years 6th Years, post Leaving Certificate, alongside their parents have built a school which now provides secondary education for those who previously would have had none. This is the **Fearless and Bold of Blackrock** in action. **Fearlessness** is taking that first step when you don't know where it may lead you. This is at the heart of missionary service. So many Spiritans **boldly** took that step in God's name. We must continue this tradition. Our boys, your sons, should see in the person of John Wambu, the difference we can make. The challenge is to encourage each boy to go beyond the usual, the expected. The Soup Run, SUAS and the St. Vincent de Paul are other examples of our faith in action.

We urge your son to find different ways, indeed to find new ways, to tackle social and environmental issues; to be proactive in the service of others, spurred on by Faith. This is 'Fides et Robur'.

Blackrock is a vibrant community; the pace and energy of Blackrock never abates. There is so much worthwhile activity - the Mental Health Awareness and Antibullying Days; the House Tens and Swimming Gala; Thursday Tunes and Literacy Day; Science and Art clubs; Family Masses and Retreats; Games and Debates, Rowing, Cycling and Running, the M.U.N. and E.Y.P. and of course the classroom activity that drives our curriculum.

It happens because of the extraordinary role models within the school. I thank the Spiritan community and our Support Staff who do phenomenal unseen work; our parents who give selflessly, many on committees; my teaching colleagues who share generously their expertise and of course the boys who are at the heart of all that we do.

On Thursday 11th October as part of Mental Health Awareness Day Transition Years attended a talk by Alan O'Mara who spoke powerfully about his own mental health journey



and what the students can do to look after both themselves and each other.

Gaisce is the President's Award that challenges students to conquer new personal skills and to serve in their communities. To date we have had a great number of students giving up their weekends to help in variety of great volunteer projects. As you will read in the charity work section below the spirit of service within this TY group is fantastic and we look forward to continuing to see it flourish over the course of the year!

To date three groups have been out on their two week Pastoral Placement. It has been great to meet the students on their return for debriefing on a Friday afternoon and see the enthusiasm with which they speak of their experience. Some of the feedback we have received from the Matthew 25 locations has been superb and makes us very proud. The feedback from Mr Madden to date has been excellent and we thank him for his tireless work with the groups so far. The next group are due to go out on 26th November, with preparation classes beginning after mid-term.

Charity Work

The students have already been very busy with charity work. 21 students volunteered to help with the Hospice Collection on the 20th September. The students raised €1,680.78 for Blackrock Hospice - "We're currently undertaking a project to upgrade our patient's rooms here at Blackrock Hospice, so I can't explain enough the difference this amount will make." On Friday 5th and Saturday 6th of October we had over 60 TY students out collecting for Operation Smile and Down Syndrome Ireland. Again they proved to be great ambassadors for the College.

Coding Module

In the modern world, computer literacy, coding and the ability to solve problems using computational thinking are becoming more popular and sought-after skills. To paraphrase Steve Jobs : Everyone should learn how to program a computer as it teaches you how to think. So far this term, two classes of Transition Year students have

completed the week-long intensive IT and Coding module with Mr O'Connell. During this week, students learned about the history of Computer Science and created online interactive timelines using JavaScript. They got hands-on experience building computers and developed fluency in Binary, the internal language of computers. During the module, classes learned how to programme mobile applications and had the opportunity to create their own unique applications and demo them on their own Android and Apple smartphones. The classes also experienced programming using real-world coding languages such as Python, HTML, and CSS. Students tracked their learning by setting up an e-portfolio which they updated daily by sharing photographs, links, videos and blog posts. The IT and Coding module is an exciting new addition to our Transition Year programme.

Other Activities

A large number of students applied to get involved in the Willow Park 5th Form Musical with the group selected scheduled to begin work after midterm. We have had

a number of students taking part in the St. Vincent's University Hospital 'So you want to be a Doctor' programme and we have more students taking part in the Dun Laoghaire Rathdown STEM Camp on Thursday afternoons. The parents' website team has been busy producing content for the parents' section of the website. Ten TY students volunteered at the Willow Park Duel in the Pool event on the 17th October and twenty more volunteers have signed up to assist Willow Park STEM Week taking place the week beginning 12th November. Archives Update



I have been working with a writer and photographer (Joseph McBrinn and Jozef Voda) over the past few months as they put together a biography of extremely talented Irish stained glass artist Evie Hone (1894-1955).


Blackrock College has a striking number and variety of stained glass pieces throughout the school from different artists, studios and time periods, from the beautiful rose window above the organ from Clarke studios, to the stunning Pentecost triptych in the Castle oratory by Hone

herself. This is one of 6 windows or sets throughout the college commissioned from Hone.

We began to email back and forth to confirm which pieces by Hone were in the College, when they were created, and their subject or content. Fr. Sean Farragher's thorough college histories and written notes by him and Caroline Mullan were of great use to me, as much of the history of the stained glass at Blackrock was not familiar to me.

A set of three bottle glass windows (at the rear of the chapel), a window featuring the crests of the missionary bishops who were Blackrock alumni (in the foyer of the chapel), the lunette window depicting Pere Leman dedicating the College to Our Lady and the Divine child, and the College Crest window at the south end of the main hall all date 1937, when they were commissioned by school President Fr. John Charles McQuaid.

The three Pentecost windows (one pictured) in the Castle Oratory was commissioned from Hone by the College Union in 1941 to commemorate Dr.

McQuaid's appointment as Archbishop of Dublin.

Finally, we have an abstract stained glass window, a memorial by Evie Hone to her colleague Mainie Jellett. This is situated in the Staff Dining Hall. This piece had actually been moved during a demolition at the Spiritan Provincialate Kimmage in the 1990s. This piece was brought to Blackrock

and installed at the time, with an extra foot of stained glass made to imitate Hone's technique. This was to fit it into the existing window in the dining hall. This piece is exceptionally beautiful and unusual when viewed next to Hone's more traditional glasswork in her other pieces.

Blackrock College was of special interest to McBrinn because we are fortunate to have acquired the very rare "cartoon" (an initial sketch of the windows at full size, indicating colours and design) of the Pentecost windows, which is displayed in the Student Dining Hall.

Another precious piece is the initial small sketch of the same windows, which can be seen framed in St. Patrick's Corridor. These pieces are invaluable extremely rare, as they give us a look into the artistic process of Hone.

Voda spent many hours with me professionally photographing the windows for the project. Stained glass is very tricky to photograph well, and we ran into some unique problems with the light exposure, especially with the Mainie Jellett piece. We eventually resorted to blacking out the surrounding windows with black bin bags! Huge thanks to all Sodexo catering team for allowing us to get this photo for the book.



Both writer and photographer were extremely grateful to Blackrock College for allowing them to study these many wonderful pieces. I am looking forward to reading the book about Evie Hone, as she led an interesting but very difficult life, tragically orphaned as a teenager, and suffering for years with health problems. House Events



CAO

All 6th Years received the results from their Centigrade Questionnaire from Cambridge Occupational Analysts. It comprises a specially designed questionnaire where the responses are analysed and matched with all the courses available and the results compiled into a personalised



workbook. The use of Centigrade can significantly improve the quality of your sons' decision- making and thus reduce the risk of selecting the wrong course. All 6th Years received a CAO talk and are presently attending Career Guidance meetings on a one to one basis with Ms Drew, along with independently researching third level courses.

Students who register for the CAO between 5th November and 20th January will pay a reduced fee of €30. The regular fee of €45 applies to applications made between 20th of January and the 1st of February.

If any student has a learning disability or a medical condition it is important to tick the appropriate box on the CAO application form. The DARE tick box is for students with disabilities and the HEAR tick box is for students applying through disadvantage. Students can find out more regarding the DARE/HEAR scheme on www.accesscollege.ie. Students with Irish and Third Language exemptions must also take necessary action to notify the relevant Higher Education Institutes (HEIs) of their exemption(s) and to submit any supporting documentation the HEIs require. Please refer to the relevant individual HEI websites for further information.

Any student applying for a government grant must tick the SUSI Grant box. There is an "Eligibility Reckoner" on their website at www.susi.ie, where you can check if you qualify for a full grant (fees & maintenance) or part grant (fees only) It is worth checking. If you are entitled to fees only, you will not have to pay the registration fees. The SUSI tick box must be ticked if a student is applying for a government grant next summer.

Documentation relating to DARE / SUSI is available on the school website in the 'Guidance Counselling Section' under the heading of 'Downloads'. Any queries please contact Ms Ryan, Ms Drew or Mr F. Hurl.

Also on the CAO application is the Trinity Feasibility study for students who are considering History (TR003), Law (TR004) and Ancient and Medieval History and Culture (TR028). Trinity is looking to reward potential alongside academic ability, a key factor which is not always recognised in the current system. There is also a tick box for this option on the CAO. More information on this is available from the Trinity website.

We have a number of students applying to UCAS this year to a variety of colleges including Cambridge and Oxford. These students will sit Cambridge entrance tests here at Blackrock over the Mid Term break. We also have a select few applying to Europe and the USA. Students considering this areas need to begin their research early. There is a lot of preparation involved.

Any student with a strong interest in Biblical Studies and/or Geology can sit a separate exam in TCD at Easter for TCD entry. Exam results can be used for points' purposes in TCD.

College Talks

November is the start of the College/University open days. Students have been encouraged to attend the numerous upcoming open days to add to the information they received from the Septembers visit to the Higher Options in the RDS. Talks are being held on European study by EUNICAS, UCD, Trinity College Dublin, Dublin Institute of Technology, Dublin City University & IADT.

A number of students have completed their UCAS applications for medical related courses. The next UCAS deadline will be the 15th of January and students are encouraged to work on their personal statements and to obtain a school reference and predicted grades from teachers to support their application. This is a more lengthy process than the CAO so any student in doubt should consult Ms Drew if they have not already done so.



Our HPAT preparation course is presently running on Saturday mornings for 6th Years. Any student considering SATs must register a month in advance for the assessment at www.collegeboard.org. Please see Ms Drew if you have registration difficulties. Have a peaceful Midterm Break.

Retreats

A central part of the Pastoral Programme in Blackrock is to give the students an opportunity to reflect. Once that was done we went through everyone in the group individually and discussed what adjectives that had been matched with and so on.



Alan O Mara from realtalks.ie spoke about how his problems snowballed, explained the process and his feeling on engaging with counselling .He said he had divulged how he felt to his friends who to his surprise were not shocked and he discovered that some had engaged in counselling themselves.

Rowing


