Dear Parents,

It has been a busy, upbeat and energetic start to the academic year with a welcome return to the classroom. It is uplifting to see so many boys on the fields and courts, in the pool, on the river and in the Sports Hall; to hear the music lessons, the ensembles and the rehearsals for 'Jesus Christ Superstar'; to attend the outstanding Rock-Ed, to meet in person our student and parent committee members, to witness boys sign up for Debating, Science, Green Schools, Chess, MUN, Public Speaking, Development Education, Art and Cookery clubs. It is great to be back!

The introduction of the one-hour periods, on a trial basis, and the 'Surface Go' devices in 2nd, 4th and 5th Year have certainly changed the tempo of our day. We recently surveyed both the teaching staff and the boys on how they have impacted teaching and learning. We will seek your view in December.

Preparation for our new Strategic Plan, 'Looking to the Future, 2022-27', is underway with the focus on the Environment, Ethos, Teaching and Learning and Wellbeing. As part of this, we will introduce a 5th imperative, '**Be Respectful**'. This is a call for respect for self as well as for others in all settings but particularly on social media where overindulgence can diminish empathy and lead to cyber-bullying.

Essential to self-respect is resilience, a capacity to keep going during tough times, to make the difficult call when peer pressure suggests otherwise. The message is that life isn't perfect and that we must learn to accept that things do not always go our way. The best way to teach our boys how to handle setback is to let them experience it. Sometimes, we may be overprotective and try to manage every situation for them.

Parenting is more complex today than it has ever been before. Your children are targeted as consumers at a very early age and these outside influences undermine your role. Teenage boys require authoritative parents that provide reasonable and flexible boundaries. Parents need the support of like-minded parents and a values led school.

At the Boarders' mass in September, Fr O'Brolchain talked about the importance of 'Robur' in the lives of our boys. He defined 'Robur' as strength of character; to act purposefully in favour of what is right. It is about dispensing with that passive role of the bystander and being a voice for good. This was the message on our Anti-Bullying Day as we urged our boys to 'Be There' for one another, to care for each other, to stand with someone who may be marginalised.

Consideration for others elevates what we do to a different level and is the essence of our Christian faith. Jesus does not leave us free to compromise on the essential matter of loving service to others. This is the difference between 'Routine and Rut'. It is the Blackrock way to routinely put others first, to reject selfish mediocrity, listless boredom and cynical detachment.

Our Christian community is forged by respect, the everyday please and thank you, the holding of a door, the taking of time to listen to each other, as we show we care. Our 'Fides' is the belief that how we treat each other is a priority. Our 'Robur' is our determination to do it again and again.

Our programme of Retreats, Week of Reconciliation, family masses and exposition of the Blessed Sacrament provided time for the boys to pause and reflect, to be grateful for who they are, to see themselves as sons of God, special and valued.

Finally, I am grateful for the prayers of our Spiritan community, the enterprise of my colleagues, the support of our College Union, the commitment of the Parents' Council and Year Committees, the understanding of our parent body and of course, the enthusiasm, energy, and interest of the boys.

Enjoy the break, with Fides et Robur.

Message from the Deans



Campus Development Programme Update



The new configuration of the upper block of playing pitches is beginning to take shape. When this work is completed in late 2022, we will have a new vista on this part of the campus housing five pitches, four of those on the upper tier and one on the lower tier on the site of the Willow U13s pitch. A cricket pitch will be located on the upper tier.



Willow Avenue, the internal roadway linking the Willow Park side of the campus with Blackrock College, has been widened by approximately 1.5m allowing for a more efficient flow of traffic in both directions and providing more space for cyclists. New Superior General of the Spiritans



FR ALAIN MAYAMA IS THE NEW SUPERIOR GENERAL OF THE SPIRITANS

The General Chapter of the Spiritans, taking place in Bagamoyo, Tanzania since October 3, has elected, on October 18, 2021, as its new Superior General, Fr. Alain Mayama, a member of the province of Congo Brazzaville and presently General Assistant in Rome.

Alain Mayama was born in Congo Brazzaville in 1971. He made his Perpetual Religious Profession in 1999. He was ordained priest in 2000.

He began his missionary life in Cameroon as formator. Having studied in the USA, he has been responsible for the Chaplaincy of the Hospital in Port Huron, Detroit, from 2007 to 2008. He continued his Mission as a formator in Libreville, Gabon from 2008 to 2010. That same year he returned to Congo Brazzaville to

serve as Provincial Superior. At the General Chapter held here in Bagamoyo in 2012, he was elected General Assistant, a position he has held in Rome until now.

It was providential to be elected on this October 18th when the church celebrates the feast of St. Luke, the Evangelist of Mercy. His are the opening words of the Spiritan Rule of Life: "The Spirit of the Lord is on me, for He has anointed me, to bring the good news to the afflicted. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives, sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim a year of favour from the Lord" (Lk 4:18-19).

Welcomed by the Chapter Assembly, Fr. Alain Mayama will have the mission of animating the more than 2500 Spiritan Missionaries working in more than 60 countries on five continents. He will also have to welcome and animate the thousands of lay people who share Spiritan Spirituality and Mission. He is the first african spiritan to be elected as Superior General.



Music and Drama




Clubs Day

Science Photography Competition

Ecology

A new device added to the Biology department this year was a night vision sensor camera. Sixth Year Biology classes set this up as part of their Ecology Field Studies. Caught on camera were a badger, foxes and squirrels. Badgers are the largest terrestrial carnivore in Ireland. It is a very good indicator species for the biodiversity in our campus. This would indicate that there must be a healthy food chain in place for them within the school grounds.



Pollution

Pollution is any harmful substance in the environment by human activity.

It can affect the air we breathe, the soil, freshwater rivers and lakes, and land.

- Causes:** Household waste, fly-tied waste, paper, plastic, glass, etc.
- Activities/Practices:** Deposit of litter, use of illegal oil, insecticides, paints and oils, Toxic use of fertilisers.
- Impacts:** Heavy toxic fertilisers, a surplus of acids, inorganic gases such as SO₂, and oil leaks.

A POLLUTANT IN AGRICULTURE

Change of Fertilisers
Fertilisers are used to improve growing in the soil. They are maximum because when crops are harvested, they take away all the nutrients in the soil. Fertiliser nutrients have to be replaced back into the soil in the form of chemical, complex or manufactured fertilisers.

The Problem
Excess artificial and organic fertilisers (from plants and animals in particular) wash into rivers and seas. This results in an enrichment of the water with nutrients, known as eutrophication. This causes an algal bloom where these algae die, they are broken down by bacteria that use up all the oxygen in the water. This results in the death of aquatic organisms such as fish.

Control measures
Controlled use of fertilisers and run-off of chemicals through legislation with a view to set up drainage.

Conservation

Conservation is the management of the environment.

Reasons for conserving organisms:

- Prevent Extinction
- Preserve habitats
- Prevent biodiversity
- Prevent scientific and educational facilities
- Prevent food supplies
- Prevent loss of plants and animals

Conservation Practices:





Archives

After five years of devoting her energy, creativity, meticulous attention and resourcefulness to the college archives, Clare Foley departed in September. We wish her the very best of luck with her career and thank her for everything she has done during her time at Blackrock.

My name is Jessica Cunningham and I am delighted to take over the role of college archivist. Like many archivists, my route to the profession has been through History at university and, more recently, I qualified as an archivist with the University of Dundee. Being an archivist is essentially about managing a sub-set of the records produced by individuals, communities and organisations during their daily transactions and events. This sub-set of records is known as archives, and they are kept because they are evidence. Evidence takes numerous forms and functions, ranging from financial ledgers to documents of identity, from photographs to databases. Here in the archives at Blackrock College is has been a pleasure to discover the enormous volume of analogue and digital records that have been retained and which hold an incredibly comprehensive memory of this school since its foundation in 1860.

Despite the fire of 1984 which destroyed thousands of documents and photographs, the archive collection includes an array of ledgers, minute books, roll books, academic records, publications, diaries, letters,

photographs, albums, film footage, audio recordings, ephemeral material – invitations, programmes and tickets – and a multitude of artefacts ranging from rugby caps to teacups. The challenge for the archives in the coming years and decades is to continue to preserve this collection, provide access to it (including digital access) and to grow it as the digital output as the College continues to grow too. Like my archivist predecessors, Fr. Sean Farragher, Caroline Madden and Clare Foley, I welcome any requests to access this collection or any research queries. Guidance and Counselling



CAO

This September we gave the 6th Years an online link to their Interest Assessment. The assessment is most helpful for boys who are unsure of the career area they are interested in. I encourage all the boys to complete the assessment. The assessment comprises of a specially designed questionnaire where the responses are analysed and matched with all the courses available, and the results compiled into a personalised workbook. The use of an interest test can significantly improve the quality of your son's decision-making and thus reduce the risk of selecting the wrong course. The CAO online application opens on November 5th. All 6th Years have received a CAO talk and a UCD college prospectus; all other prospectuses can be downloaded online from individual websites.

Students who register for the CAO between 5th November and 20th January will pay a reduced fee of €30. The regular fee of €45 applies to applications made between 20th of January and the 1st of February.

If any student has a learning disability or a medical condition it is important to tick the appropriate box on the CAO application form. The DARE tick box is for students with disabilities and the HEAR tick box is for students applying through disadvantage. Students can find out more regarding the DARE/HEAR scheme on www.accesscollege.ie. Students with Irish and Third Language exemptions must also take necessary action to notify the relevant Higher Education Institutes (HEIs) of their exemption(s) and to submit any supporting documentation the HEIs require. Please refer to the relevant individual HEI websites for further information.



Any student applying for a government grant must tick the SUSI Grant box. There is an "Eligibility Reckoner" on their website at www.susi.ie, where you can check if you qualify for a full grant (Fees & Maintenance) or part grant (Fees only). It is worth checking, if you are entitled to Fees only, you will not have to pay the registration fees. The SUSI tick box must be ticked if a

student is applying for a government grant next summer. If you have any concerns relating to DARE please contact Ms. Emily Ryan or Ms. Natasha Drew.

Also on the CAO application is the Trinity Feasibility study for students who are considering History (TR003), Law (TR004) and Ancient and Medieval History and Culture (TR028). Trinity is looking to reward potential alongside academic ability, a key factor which is not always recognised in the current system. There is also a tick box for this option on the CAO. More information on this is available from the Trinity website.

Any student with a strong interest in TCD and taking Religion or Geography may be interested in the Biblical and/or the Geology exam organised by TCD at Easter. Exam results can be used for points' purposes in TCD.

UCAS



A number of students are applying to UCAS this year to a variety of colleges including Cambridge and Oxford. These students will sit Cambridge entrance tests here at Blackrock where we have a registered centre, run by Ms. Drew. We also have a select few applying to Europe and the USA. Students

considering these areas need to begin their research early. There is a lot of preparation involved.

The attention for some of our athletes now turns to the Cross Country and Multi Events over the coming months.


