At our recent Carol Service Fr. Cormac, reminded us to R.O.C.K. to Reach Out with Caring and Kindness to our siblings, our parents, and grandparents. That is an incredibly important message at any time of the year but especially at Christmas. Christmas can be a challenging time for people, particularly those on the margins of our society and maybe we can extend our reaching out and push ourselves a little further than family and friends. In Ireland today, 13,179 people are homeless and 3,991 of those are children. That is a startling figure. It is very easy to become accustomed and desensitised to shocking figures like this, but we shouldn't. If we accept these kinds of figures as the norm in our society, then we accept that there is nothing that we can or should do and, in a

season known for hope and action, that is not something we should accept. As Pope Francis said, "Poverty has a face" – behind every statistic is the face of a child, the face of a family, the face of people, young and old.

Every year, in the run up to Christmas we, in the College, raise funds for St. Vincent de Paul and sometimes we can forget the faces in need of these funds. Jim Murphy wrote a small piece for the Newsletter, and I think it is important to share with you a glimpse of the thoughts of those that benefit from our fundraising.

The Blackrock College St. Vincent de Paul Conference is involved in many projects but two of the main ones are:

- Scholarships at 3rd level for students mainly living in Tallaght West and for refugees who have arrived in Ireland in the recent past.
- 2. Christmas Hampers the purchase, packing and delivery of 225 Christmas hampers to the families of Cushlawn and Killinarden in West Tallaght.

The following is an extract of a letter of application we received last September from a 2nd year business student in TU Tallaght

Last year, I managed to balance the financial difficulties of attending College by working at weekends and some weekdays and I was able to afford books and money for food and travel. I feel this affected my ability to achieve my best when it came to having more time for my studies. I am the only child with a single Mum, and I am the first of my extended family to attend 3rd level. Receiving this scholarship would be such an amazing opportunity as it would be a weight off my shoulders, and I do not have to rely on my mother for extra support for books, food and travel.

The SVP recently received a thank you letter from a scholarship student who obtained her degree in Psychiatric Nursing in which she says:

Please do not stop helping anyone who needs help---you were a great help to me.

A huge thank you to the boys and their parents for all the support in the quizzes, the Christmas tree project, the hamper delivery, the mince pie morning, the soccer marathon, the cycle-a-thon and the 24 hour fast.

If you have had the opportunity to read 'Poor' by Katriona O'Sullivan, you will know that she talks about her life growing up in poverty and the fact that education empowered her, "I have been able to change my life, my children's lives. I'm not costly any more to the state. I'm not doing all of the things that happen when you live in poverty". Changing society by investing in the education of those less fortunate is a powerfully positive step for the betterment of all and that is why we focus on St. Vincent de Paul, why we continue to R.O.C.K. for St. Vincent de Paul. As Pope Francis said, "None of us can think we are exempt from concern for the poor and for social justice".

May you and your families experience the blessings of the season and may we all continue to R.O.C.K. this Christmas and throughout the New Year.








Parent Recommended Book Corner

- moving story about a small Japanese café that offers its visitors a chance to travel back in time.
- **4.** The Bee Sting by Paul Murray: Shortlisted for the Man-Booker prize, a portrayal of an Irish family in crisis, it's funny, sad, sharp-witted and well worth the read
- **5.** My Father's House by Joseph O'Connor: This is an intriguing fictional book that is based on the true story of Monsignor Hugh O'Flaherty who set up a choir to help rescue resistance fighters, PoWs and jews from Nazi occupied Rome.








Rememberance




two teams of four. We hope to invite local schools from the area. A big thank you to our coach Hector for helping us with this. We are looking forward to competing in the New Year.
