Interviews.







Lastly, the year ended with the Junior Gold Medal Debate on May 10th.



Library Classes and Workshops

Ms A Dillon facilitated the following classes and workshops:

History RSR Research Class

Ms Pierce's, Mr Halpin's and Mr Deasy's 5th Year history classes attended a class on how to do research for their RSR History project. Students learned about resources like JSTOR, local library online resources, the steps needed to do research including: identifying the author, being aware of bias, tone, finding evidence and comparing their results with other resources.

Mock Trial

Mr Halpin's CSPE class took part in a mock trial where they had to determine if a person was guilty of assault. Students learned about the significance of intention to cause harm, what burden of proof means and the difference between open ended and closed questions. The library was set up like a court room and students had to prepare for and enact the trial. The idea of the exercise was that students would learn about the various responsibilities in a court room.

Historical Fiction Creative Writing Class

Ms Dillon invited Mr Deasy's 2nd year English class to choose a historical event or person from the History magazines in the library. Students used the event or person as a base for an idea to create a historical fiction story. The story could have been anything from fantasy, sci-fi or futuristic. The purpose of the class was to encourage use of history resources in the library, while also learning how to develop ideas for writing a story.

Seamus Heaney Workshop with the National Library of Ireland

The Spiritan Showcase

The 3rd of May was Blackrock College's turn to host the annual Spiritan Schools' Global Citizenship Showcase. The other Spiritan schools in Ireland were invited to attend the event, and Rockwell College and St Michael's College were both present for the day's activities. During the opening ceremony, each school presented a video in which they showed what their Global Citizenship Committee had accomplished that year.

Once the ceremony concluded, the students present were separated into groups in order to mix the students from the different classes. The workshops ranged from topics on class difference to migration. After the workshops were finished, the groups of students went around different rooms of the school, "visiting" the Global Citizenship Committees of countries around the world through Zoom calls. The countries that the Global Citizenship Committee called were Sierra Leone, Portugal, Tanzania, Kenya and the US. The students had the chance on these calls to learn about issues affecting these countries, such as the housing crisis in Portugal.







After the students finished speaking to the students from the different schools, they gathered in the sports hall for a final time, where Frank Browne of the Spiritan Education Trust gave an address. In it, he discussed how we are a shining example of global citizens as we are making the effort to address the injustices present in our society.

Woods provided an insightful analysis based on his extensive analysis and reporting, shedding light on the issues that have led to the shortage of affordable homes. Ó Broin, on the other hand, offered a


Scientific Discovery for the Classroom





The Archives....



Update from Blackrock College Archives


There has been a recent surge of interest in the College's magnificent collection of stained glass. Art historians Dr David Caron and Dr Joseph McBrinn have renewed interest in the works of Michael Healy and Evie Hone with their publications. Their research has brought them to the College and the archives as they traced the artists' connections to Blackrock College and the College's role in commissioning their works in the early decades of the 20th century.

David Caron's book – 'Michael Healy 1873-1941; an Túr Gloine's Stained Glass Pioneer' – was published earlier this year by Four Courts Press. The publication's numerous illustrations include several of Healy's pair of 2-lights flanking the altar in the chapel. These pairs depict the Annunciation and the Visitation and, as Caron writes, 'are two of Healy's most profoundly sublime works'.

Joseph McBrinn's publication – 'Evie Hone and the International Avant Garde' – will be published next spring (also by Four Courts Press) and positions Hone as both an important Irish and international artist within the radical artistic movements of the 20th century. Evie Hone's work is to be found in the college chapel, staff dining hall and in the beautiful Pentecostal triptych in the Castle Oratory.

This recent scholarship has renewed interest in the College's stained glass bringing a large tour of stained glass enthusiasts

from the UK's Stained Glass Museum in April and the Friends of the National Gallery of Ireland will arrive in June. archives@blackrockcollege.com

Double check all is in order, especially that your exam number and any LANGUAGE EXEMPTIONS ARE RECORD-ED THERE. Please contact the NUI 01 4392424 if the NUI language exemption is not listed.

Check your Junk/Trash mailbox.

The CAO remains open until 1st of July. Please do not panic and edit your CAO after your Leaving Certificate. You made this list while you were calm and thinking logically, do not go editing it with emotions and presumptions.

PLC – PLC Colleges have an ongoing application process, it is not too late to sign up. It is no harm to register and have that back up ready. You can register on their



respective websites for a one-year courses with a view to progressing to university.

DARE applicants will be informed of their DARE status mid-June. This does

not guarantee a seat, it just means DARE acknowledge your disability and you will be added to the DARE list of each course. When



the course offers come out for everyone, you will then know if you were offered the course through DARE.

If you are not successful with DARE you have a window of time to appeal it and send them stronger documentation. Please contact me if you are unsure about a decision, be it with your leaving cert results or your CAO offers. We will be available to meet on those days. Best of luck to all our Leaving Cert Students, we will still be here to support you if need be, do not be afraid to reach out.
