In their home opener against Marian, 'Rock took control early, posting 34 points in the first half while allowing just 13. A disciplined mix of zone and one-on-one defence kept Marian contained throughout. Despite a brief third-quarter surge from the visitors, 'Rock maintained composure and closed out the game confidently.

The momentum continued away to Gonzaga, where early offensive drives from Sergio Martinez (4th Year), Denis Lucey (2nd Year), and Luka Daly (3rd Year) established a commanding 24–8 halftime lead. Gonzaga rallied to narrow the gap to 29–20, but 'Rock responded with sharp defensive play. David Freeman (4th Year) and Luka Daly dominated the boards, while Dylan Walshe (3rd Year) applied relentless pressure, forcing key turnovers.

Sergio Martinez led the scoring across both fixtures with a combined 48 points, supported by standout contributions from **Denis Lucey** (24 points). Captain **Tom O'Brien** (3rd Year) and the entire squad can take immense pride in a strong and

confident start to the season.

The Blackrock College U19 team have also recorded victories over both Marian College and Gonzaga College SJ.

Congratulations to the **Sixth Years** on a well-deserved and hard-fought win!




















Art Club: Linking Wellbeing and Literacy
